3 EASY WAYS TO PAY



FasTrak®

Pay with a transponder. Drivers choosing this option enjoy lower tolls (\$1 less per toll point) and can use the transponder on toll roads, lanes and bridges throughout the state. Drivers are issued a transponder and pay tolls automatically from a pre-established account that can be prepaid and replenished using credit card, cash or check.



ExpressAccount®

No transponder is required for drivers who choose this option for use only on the 73, 133, 241 and 261 Toll Roads. A photo of your car's license plate is scanned and connected to the account you set up.



Online Payment

This is an ideal option for one-time users. Simply go to TheTollRoads.com within five days of using the 73, 133, 241 or 261 Toll Roads and enter your license plate number and pay. We also offer a mobile app for payment. There are no invoices, prepayments, statements or transponders.



Q. How does toll financing work?



Toll roads, like those in Orange County, are primarily funded through private financing. Tolls collected are used to pay back the debt incurred to build the roads. Tolls are voluntary user fees. Drivers can choose to pay tolls or take alternative routes. In Orange County, toll road financing enabled officials to be creative and fund transportation improvements at the local level.

Q. What are the benefits of toll financing?



The primary benefits are better, safer roads; less congestion; more predictable trip times; additional choice; and reduced need for taxes to pay for roads. Toll road financing is one of the tools in the tool box to provide sustainable funding as fewer and fewer state and federal dollars for transportation are available.

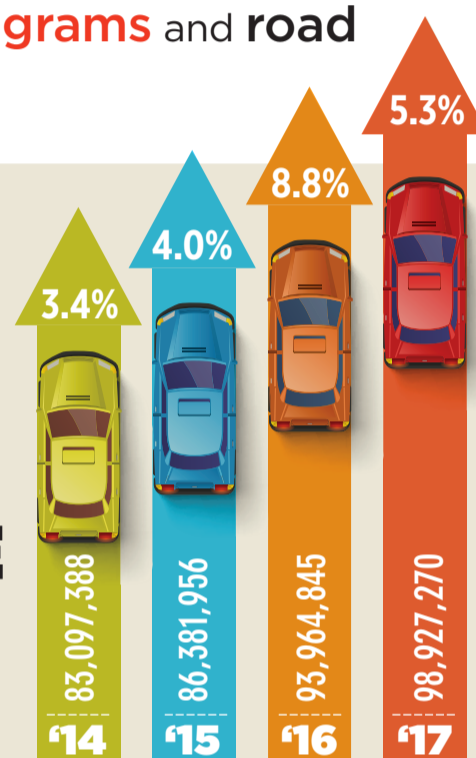
FASTRAK WORKS on any toll road, lane or bridge in California.



Where does your toll go?

The majority of tolls paid by drivers on the 73, 133, 241 and 261 go toward **paying off debts** taken on to **build the roads**. Part of the toll also covers the cost of **toll collection**, **environmental programs** and **road improvements**.
